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

Patient care – Establishing diagnosis and implementing a therapeutic plan



Why high diagnostic error rate?

- Sources of diagnostic errors: systemrelated factors and cognitive factors
- For cognitive factors, usually not because of a lack of knowledge, but problems with the clinician's thinking (cognitive biases/errors)
- Hovers round ~ 15% (Elstein 2009; Graber et al, 2012)





A Broader Definition

• Diagnostic errors is defined as the failure to (a) establish an accurate and timely explanation of the patient's health problem(s) or (b) communicate that explanation to the patient.
